

# WEEKLY STUDY IN ELUL



Contemporary Judaism has been deeply influenced by a revival of Jewish mystical traditions emphasizing a personal connection with the sacred. In these four sessions we will learn about and experience spiritual practices rooted in Jewish mystical teachings.

All classes will be held at Temple Emanu-El from **7:00-8:30 pm**. All are welcome for any of the sessions. There is no fee for members; a donation of any amount is requested from guests.

#### Session 1: Mysticism (Sept. 3)

In the first class we will explore mystical teachings from the past while learning how they have been brought forward into contemporary belief and practice.

#### Session 2: Meditation (Sept. 10)

Mystical practices have emerged from diverse Jewish communities for thousands of years. This session will introduce various meditation that have become part of contemporary Jewish ritual.

#### Session 3: Mindfulness (Sept. 17)

While the term "mindfulness has come to us from Buddhism, the cultivation of spiritual awareness is, of course, profoundly Jewish as well. In this class we will consider how a range of Jewish traditions, such as prayer, kashrut, and shabbat, may enhance mindfulness in our own lives.

#### Session 4: Meaningful High Holidays (Sept. 24)

In this final session we will discuss High Holiday traditions in light of the mystical ideas and practices we have studied, seeking to give them greater meaning in the coming year.


